

Dates and Deadlines

- May 30 90-Day Notice Mailed, August Primary
- July 30 Voter Registration Deadline, August Primary
- August 1 August Primary Ballots Mailed
- August 17 Last Day to Request Mail Ballot
- August 22 Last Day to Return Ballot By Mail (*6 days prior recommended*)
- August 28 Primary Election Day
- October 9 Voter Registration Deadline, November General (*Tuesday due to Holiday*)
- October 10 November General Ballots Mailed
- October 26 Last Day to Request Mail Ballot
- October 31 Last Day to Return Ballot By Mail (6 days prior recommended)
- November 6 General Election Day






2018 Fall Elections – How will voters receive their ballot?

- Primary Election August 28, 2018
 - Party Voters will receive their affiliation ballot by mail or at a polling location
 - Independent and No Party Designated voters must select a party ballot
 - 90-Day Notification sent to voters urging them to request their ballot
 - Polling Location voters may select their ballot of choice when they vote
 - Ballot Request (MCED) <u>www.Request.Maricopa.Vote</u>
- General Election November 6, 2018
 - All voters will receive the general election ballot whether through PEVL, a one-time mail-ballot request, or at their polling location




Myth: Independents Cannot Vote in the Primary Election





Independent Voters & Primary Elections/

- Arizona statute allows voters who are not registered with a political party to vote in certain primaries and races contained within
- Recorders throughout Arizona provide notice to those voters who would otherwise have received a ballot as a Permanent Early Vote List subscriber. These notices are called 90-Day Notices
- Independent PEVL subscribers <u>MUST</u> select a party ballot to vote in the Primary


Consolidated Elections 2018

- During 2018's session, the legislature passed and governor signed House Bill 2604, making voter participation a matter of statewide concern.
 - Political Subdivisions where the turnout experiences a "significant decrease," starting in 2018, would be required to consolidate their election.
 - The statute requires those cities (including charter cities), municipalities and other political subdivisions move their elections to a "**statewide**" election date.
 - Fall 2018 will be the first metrics measured for those holding elections not currently on consolidated dates.

Consolidated Elections – For Now, What's to Consider?



• Dates to Consider:

- The second Tuesday in March
- The third Tuesday in May
- The tenth Tuesday before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November

• Primary or General Election Dates

- Independents must choose their ballot if consolidating to the August ballot
- Increased ballot length on the November Ballot (Real Estate!)
- Voter Fatigue Ballot Roll-Off Voter Drop-Off

Polling places (724 precincts)

- E-Pollbooks
- In-Precinct Tabulators (Insight)
- Pre-printed ballots

...and PEVL (Permanent Early Vote List)

- Mail to <u>1.6 million voters</u>
- Receive and scan for Signature Verification
- Receive and Sort Good-Sig, separate ballot from envelope
- Central Tabulation (1.3 million in 2016 General)

Security and Accountability

Reduce points of vulnerability

- Close Networks
- Encrypt Networks
- Decrease Ballot Handling
- Professionalize Staff
 - IT Deployment/set-up
 - Increase training opportunities
 - Board worker on-site training
 - Cross training
 - Experience-driven Election Day

- Increase Accountability
 - Ballot Tracking
 - Affidavit Envelope & Signature
 - Mail and Internal Tracking
 - Ballot Printing
 - Time, Date Roster (by style)
 - Individual per voter
 - Post-Election accounting
 - (Reduce waste, 7-10 Pallets of paper per election)

 - Signature Verification by trained county staff
- Ballot Count & Tabulation system
 - In-Precinct:

 - Central Count:
 - OPTECH 400-C Ver: 3.00P



- Three to Twelve SiteBook Check-In Stations
- One to Two Ballot On Demand Printers


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Barcode Scanner for Licenses, Voter Identification & Digital Voter ID Card

- Touchscreen Interface with Privacy Screens
- Barcode Scanner also used for Board Worker
- "Gatekeeper" Security Screens
- Mounted on a Rotating Tray to Allow for Board Worker Access from Behind the SiteBook
- Multilingual
- Inverts Black/White Background for Easy Reading

Statistics & Election Comparison

2017 Jurisdictional Elections

- Average Check-In Time:
 - Signature Verification on Aff. Envelope used for Identification = <u>31 Seconds</u>
- Provisional Balloting:
 - 44 Provisional Ballots Cast
 - Historical:
 - 2013: ~2,900 (98.5% reduction)
 - 2015: ~2,700
 - 14 Valid Ballots Cast

2018 Congressional District 8 Primary

- Average Check-In Time:
 - Board Workers Checking ID at the Polls (Per Statute) = <u>75 Seconds</u>
- Provisional Balloting:
 - 531 Provisional Ballots Cast
 - Historical:
 - 2016 PRI: ~3,200 (83.5% reduction)
 - 2016 GEN: ~52,200 (would have been 9,100 with current system)
 - 447 Valid Ballots Cast (System Allows for Out-Of-Precinct Voting)


