

\$260M one-time income tax rebate in FY 2024



\$7.0M Coordinated Reentry Funding (baseline)

FY 2024 STATE BUDGET

County Touchpoints

CSA Priorities



ADJC Cost Shift: Partially continued; \$6.7M cost to Maricopa County, \$1.7M savings to Pima County

Probation Officer Salaries:

- A late-night floor amendment *removed* language requiring counties to absorb additional costs to the state as a result of FY2024 salary adjustments
- Appropriated **\$6.75M** to cover the remaining state share of FY 2023 salary adjustments

EORP Debt Payoff: Not included

Flexibility Language: Continued for FY 2024

Local Infrastructure Matching Funds:

- New Rural Broadband Accelerated Match (RBAM) fund;
 \$23.6M deposit (Counties eligible for 50%)
- \$12.5M deposit to the State Match Advantage for Rural Transportation (SMART) program.

ALTCS: County contributions increase **\$13.5M (+3.8%)** from FY 2023

ENACTED



- HB 2015 Retirement plans; plan election; rehire (Livingston)
 - Allows members to make a new plan election in the event of a transfer to a new agency or a bona fide separation of service.
- HB 2028 PSPRS; contribution rates (Livingston)
 - Reduces Tier 2 and Tier 1 gap PSPRS member contributions to 7.65%, allows previously siloed employee contributions to be used to calculate the employer rate.
- **SB 1173** public retirement systems; plan election (Mesnard)
 - Administrative bill, includes change to allow members to make a new plan election in the event they move into a role with different election options.
- SB 1376 NOW: appropriation; deputies; detention officers (Gowan)
 - Modifies FY 2023 retention/recruitment stipend requirements for sheriff's deputies and detention officers. Requires funds to be distributed to officers by October 30, 2023 and allows any unspent retention funds to be spent on recruitment bonuses.

 - Prop 400 extension
- **SB 1263** business personal property; tax exemption (*Mesnard*)
- **SB 1276** assessed valuation; class one property (*Mesnard*)

Select Bills: Pension/Finance

FY '24 BUDGET



- Appropriates **\$150** M to ADOH for deposit in the Housing Trust Fund.
- Appropriates \$40 M to ADOH for the Homeless Shelter and Services Fund.
- Appropriates **\$5** M for transitional and reentry housing and **\$2** M for transitional housing grants to ADCRR.





Property Owners Who Benefit from Public Infrastructure – pay their fair share of capital costs based on benefit.*	Yes	Yes	
Public Hearing(s) allow Property Owners to Protest the Improvements and object to being included in the District.	Yes	Yes	
Preliminary Engineering Plans and Specifications Completed and Contract Awarded.**	Yes	Maybe. Additional requirements below would add costs/delays to the transaction. Very unlikely a contractor could be found who would hold bid during required process.	
After the Final Resolution of Protests –a New Petition (or added steps) was added requiring:	Not Required	 Petition requires signatures from owners of more than one-half of the taxable property units within the area of the proposed ID, and Signatures from property owners owning collectively more than one-half of the assessed valuation of property within the proposed ID *Must be gathered within 120 days of final resolution of any protests 	
Proposed Legislative Solution:		See attached. Simply removes the above additional petition requirements – reverting back to the law as written prior to 2016.	

* ASSESSMENTS ARE NOT A PROPERTY TAX. Assessments allocated to each property owner based on benefit calculation.
